1. Trustee Mario Pascucci: Can staff provide an update on enrollment at St. Sofia CES?

Associate Director Del Bianco: As reported last week, the Kindergarten registration deadline has passed and we did not exceed the cap of 60. There are only a few grades below the grade cap of 60 students per grade. We have committed to keeping the community informed and will do so following our meeting next week. As this is a regional school, we will provide any communications sent to the school community to all trustees.

2. Trustee Bruno Iannicca: Can staff advise if the meeting for parents/guardians regarding the procurement process has been set?

Executive Superintendent Cherepacha: We are working with Superintendent Brunton and the Central Committee for Catholic School Councils (CCCSC) to put together a parent engagement evening, our target is mid-March.

3. Trustee Stefano Pascucci: The Ontario Secondary Standard Literacy Test (OSSLT) testing is coming, do we have enough devices for all Grade 9 and 10 students to do the testing?

Associate Director Del Bianco: We have not had any secondary administrators contact us to indicate they do not have sufficient devices to ensure the testing runs smoothly. If there are any concerns, we would request that administrators contact our Chief Information Officer (CIO) Mike Damad.

4. Trustee Stefano Pascucci: It has come to my attention that some teachers feel restricted on the number of photocopies they are permitted, and with set limits, they cannot make it through the school year as planned.

Director Mazzorato: We will raise this with administrators.

5. Trustee Bruno Iannicca: Is there an update on the number of outstanding Chromebooks?

Associate Director Del Bianco: There are less than 200 outstanding Chromebooks from the 50,000 distributed system-wide during the pandemic.

6. Trustee Bruno Iannicca: Previously we discussed that there would be a report on the secondary sportsfields, is that available?

Superintendent Thomas: We anticipate presenting the report at the April or May Administration and Finance Committee meeting. The surveying of all fields is complete, and the report is being drafted. We endeavour to provide information on what opportunities are available, options based on size, location and amenities nearby.

Associate Director Del Bianco: The report will also define what cannot fit due to issues such as drainage or size. This report will provide an inventory of what we have and will inform our revitalization strategy.

7. Trustee Luz del Rosario: Is there any update on digital signs requested last year?

Superintendent Thomas: As part of the 2022 Facility Renewal, we do have twenty schools set to receive digital signs. Unfortunately, with some funding due dates, we had to complete other projects and delay the signs. We will prioritize the 20 digital signs and install them in 2023. The work should be carried out during the summer months. We will distribute a schedule to trustees when it is available.

**BACKGROUND**

On April 17, 2023, the Ministry of Education released memorandum 2023:B04 - 2023-24 Grants for Student Needs (GSN) Funding 2023:B05 to 2023-24 Priorities and Partnerships Funding (PPF) introduced Bill 98, The Better Schools and Student Outcomes (Bill 98). Together, the announcements provide the required information to continue the budget development process.

This report provides a preliminary analysis of the GSN information and potential impact to Dufferin Catholic District School Board (Dufferin Catholic District School Board) as a high level overview of Bill 98

**DISCUSSION**

Funding for school boards has been different during the last few years. A significant amount of funding has been provided as time limited through the PPF process which is outside of the GSN and targets specific funding areas with restrictions and accountability measures. Examples of these include the COVID-19 Learning Recovery Fund (LRF) and the Tutoring Grant.

For the 2023-2024 year, the Ministry of Education has announced targeted funding. Tied to better

#### Consistent Information and Approaches to Student Learning

The GSN for the 2023-2024 year includes the funding for the negotiated salary and benefit increase for the Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE) as well as a provision for upcoming labour negotiations for other agreements that expire on August 31, 2022.

The Supports for Students Fund (SSF) will continue in 2023-2024, subject to the outcome and conclusion of upcoming negotiations. The SSF funding has existed for a number of years, previously referred to as

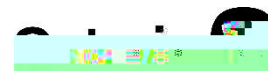
